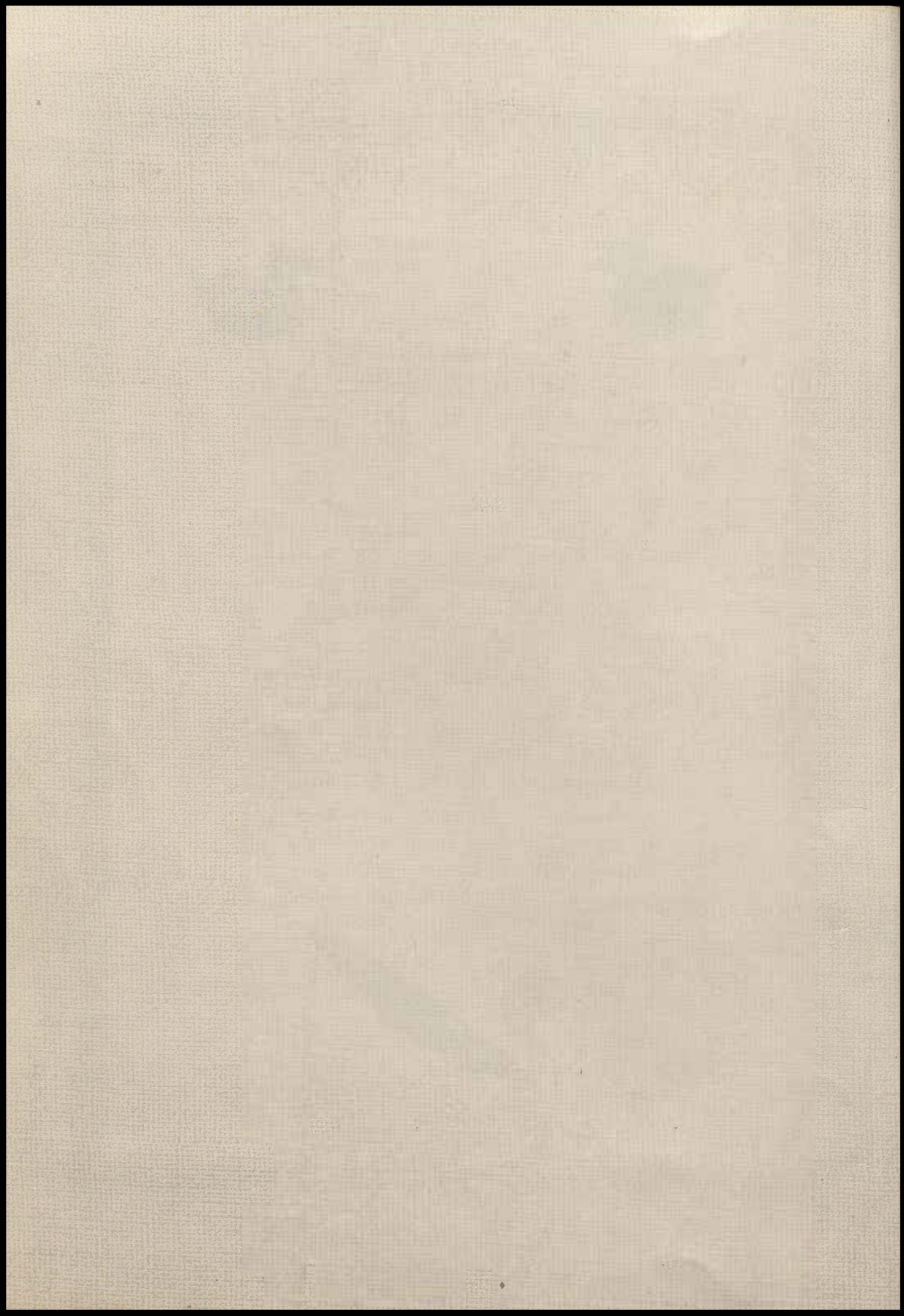
To us, Blackduck High School means progress; a symbol of happy hours spent in study, work, activities and joyful associations. In other words this is where we learn to live, and live to learn.

## Fourth

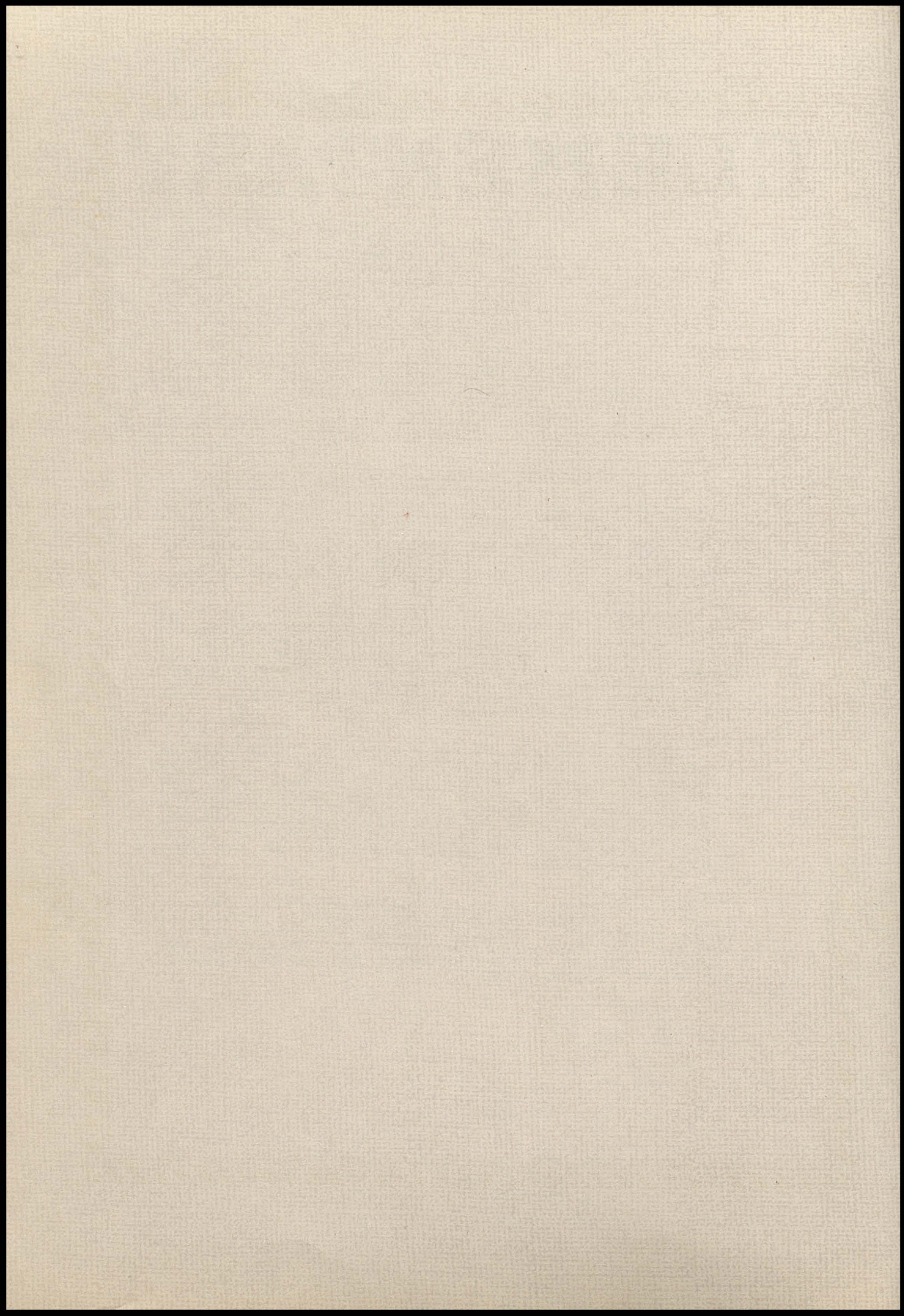

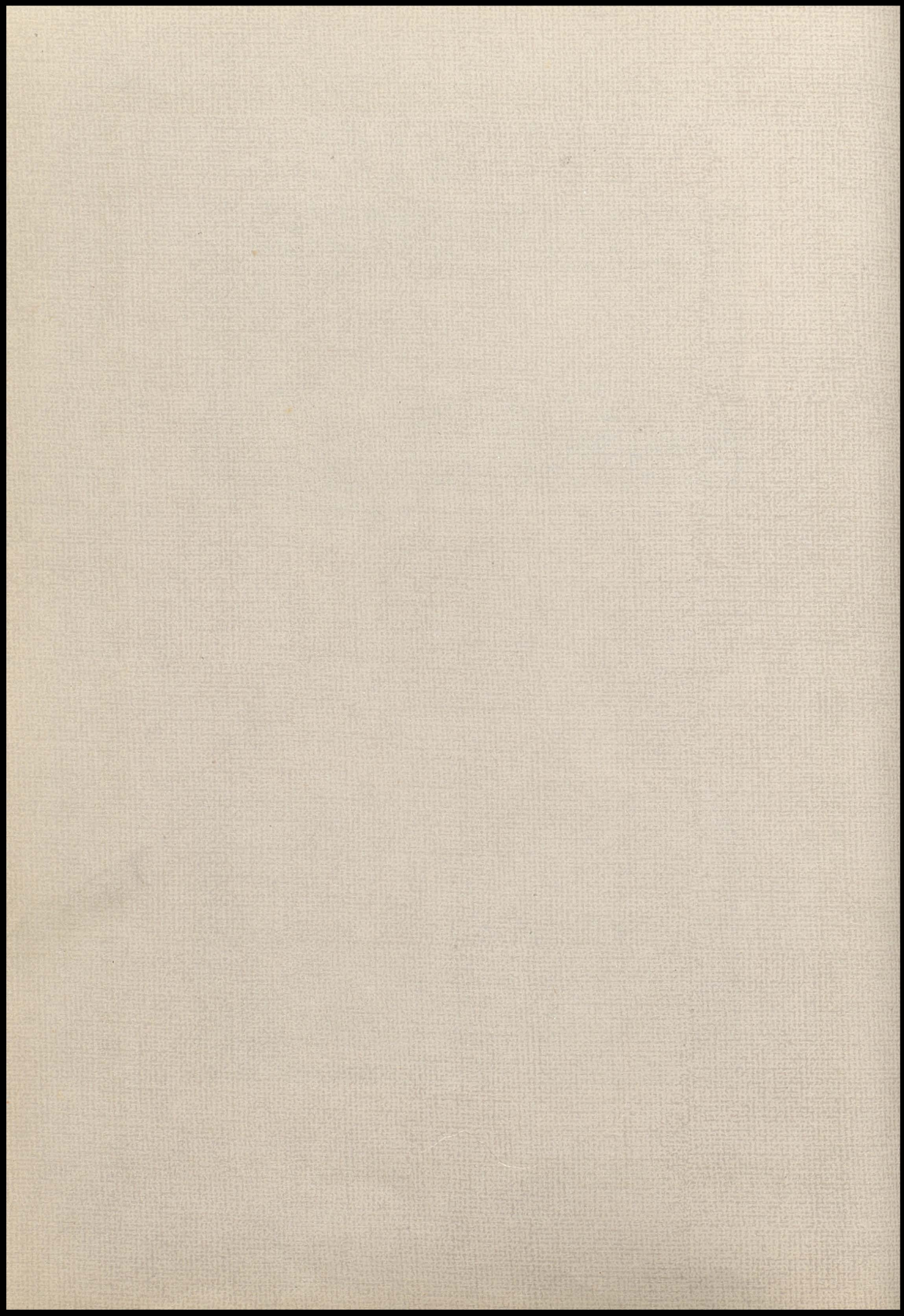


CONCERT BAND
